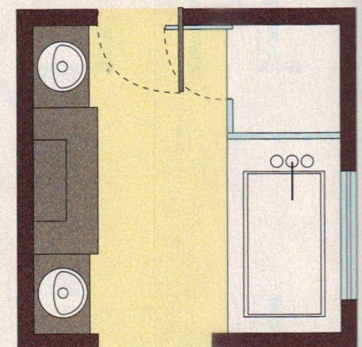
When Tim and Vicky Delay of suburban Atlanta, Georgia, could no longer stand the chipping plain ceramic tile, small cabinets and cramped stall shower of their master bath, they turned to designer Cheryl Pett of Cheryl Pett Design for help. The couple's most immediate concern was privacy. Pett was surprised to see the blinds pulled down at all times, despite the large window above the tub. It turns out the window

overlooked a basketball court in a neighbors' yard, thus eliminating privacy and any natural light. To remedy the situation, Pett chose glass blocks that permit plenty of light but block an outside view. "We kept running outside to make sure you couldn't see through the glass!" she says.

The next challenge was to create storage space. In addition to the cabinets beneath the his-and-hers vanities, Pett installed a series of drawers. It was crucial to the wife that all of her makeup items fit within the drawers, so she accompanied Pett to the showroom, bottles in hand, to test them out before making the final selection. On top of the granite countertop, Pett placed a wood-framed accessories tower with a glass front so the couple could display items. She trimmed the wood with a crown molding to tie the room together with the original crown molding that ran along the border, the only remaining detail of the original bathroom. In order to make the bathroom cohesive with the other rooms in the house, Pett added feet to the vanity so that it mimics the furniture throughout the home. "One of the greatest compliments I receive is when clients tell me that I filled the need so well that they now have excess storage space," she says. The last component in the remodel was the shower. In order to create a spa-like ambience, Pett enlarged the existing shower, replaced the small stall door with large panes of glass, and added rainheads and a body spray. To mimic a "soothing, calming" spa environment, she eliminated the white tile throughout and replaced it with more natural materials. "I used tone-on-tone light colors with natural woods in the vanity and surrounding tub panels. I chose pretty turquoise and blue-green slate as accents to the shower and tub. It's very nature inspired and calming," Pett says. *—Kate A. Schwab*
